KEYNOTE SPEECH

Discourses of Deglobalization and Globalization of Knowledge

Outline for the Keynote Address

In late May 2022, the world is at a crossroad. Sociologists like to refer to it as a juncture, a moment of uncertainty. On the one hand, we hear about deglobalization as replacing the optimism and promises of globalization, on the other hand the need for globalization of knowledge is at its peak now,

especially to tackle the problems confronting the world.

Globalization is a phenomenon of increasing worldwide interconnectedness that combines economic, cultural and social transformations. In this chapter, I am adopting a broader - that is, more holistic – definition of globalization. The main argument is based on the premise that globalization is a historical process which we can better understand as a process of processes that has unfolded in different phases. In the present phase of globalization, knowledge production and, especially, higher education drives, and is driven by, globalization. I examine the state of the play of knowledge production in the context of higher education, analyze different aspects of higher education, and implications of different aspects of higher education and in conclusion, I reflect if and how some of the lessons can be relevant for the countries of the South.

Before proceeding any farther, I must define globalization and contextualize the debates over deglobalization.

Defining Globalization:

Sometimes it is easier to define a concept by suggesting what it is not. Since globalization has become a buzz word, as a concept it has lost its analytical purchase. To dispel the populist meanings, below, I present – somewhat schematically - what globalization is not:

- Globalization is NOT McDonaldization (a term developed by sociologist George Ritzer) or, Americanization.
- In other words, globalization is NOT Westernization.
- Globalization is NOT Capitalism globalized (neo-liberal globalization is one form of globalization). That capitalism has an in-built tendency to be global goes back to Adam Smith in the 18th century, and Karl Marx in the 19th century.

Globalization is, according to Roland Robertson, who first introduced the term in social sciences is compression of the world and a growing conciousness about the compression of world.

Globalization is a macro-social process, which is entangled and contingent. It connects and loosely integrates, transforms and gets transformed. It is a series of inescapable entanglements.

Is Globalization over? What about deglobalization?

Like the rumor of Mark Twain's death, the report of the demise of globalization is an exaggeration.

- Brexit hindered regionalization, but other forms of regional and global cooperation continued and Europe is united again
- Regionalization and its changing forms are aspects of globalization
- Not one globalization but many globalizations
- Even before the COVID-19, it was claimed that globalization was over
- The January / February 2017 issue of the Foreign Affairs has several articles on deglobalization
- Brexit and the presidency of Donald Trump in 2016 were supposedly solid proofs of deglobalization
- Covid-19 has slowed down the flow of international trade, initially threatened the global supply-chain, affected global travel but did not affect global communication. ICT and e-business worldwide enjoyed a remarkable growth.
- Globalization cannot be reduced to economic globalization.
- How to rescue globalization from a narrow, reductionist definition?
- Russia-Ukraine war is a setback for globalization, but a temporary one.

Changing Globalization

- Globalization is multi-dimensional
- There are multiple discourses of globalization (Robertson and Khondker, 1998 *International Sociology*, 13:1)
- Globalization is not static, it is dynamic Globalization is.
- Not a thing or an episode, it is a process
- "The globalization process must change and adapt to newly emerging conditions if we are to plan more effectively for global pandemics, financial crises, economic inequality and imbalances in populations movements through migration" (Turner and Khondker, 2010:3).
- Conceptualizing Globalization: Thin versus Thick Theory of Globalization.
- Thin theory Tom Friedman World is flat internet and economy, globalization is simply defined as global spread of "neo-liberalism" which originated with Reagan / Thatcher era of the 1980s and boosted by the collapse of the "really existing socialism"

• **Thick theory** – Richard Florida - World is uneven – sociological theory (economy is embedded in society). The process began long time ago with earlier trade links, silk road, spread of religion, ideas, technology.

Thin versus Thick Theories of Globalization

- Thin theory or economic globalization homogenization
- Thick theory or sociological globalization heterogenization (glocalization is an example)
- If we accept the thin theory of globalization, then yes there is likely deglobalization
- If we accept and we must accept the Thick or sociological theory of globalization the march of globalization will continue, especially with regard to knowledge production and knowledge sharing.

The key world problems: pandemic, climate change, war and peace, and sustainable and equitable economic growth all depend on global cooperation, a humane, interactive globalization where cooperation in knowledge production will play a key role.

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
